Working primarily across Odisha and West Bengal, AJKA is committed to advancing sustainable, inclusive and community-led development. Over the years, AJKA has evolved as a grassroots development organisation working across key areas including sustainable livelihoods, environmental conservation, quality education, adolescent and community health, and participatory governance. The organisation places particular emphasis on empowering women, children, adolescents and vulnerable communities, including people belonging to Scheduled Tribes, Scheduled Castes and other socially and economically disadvantaged sections.

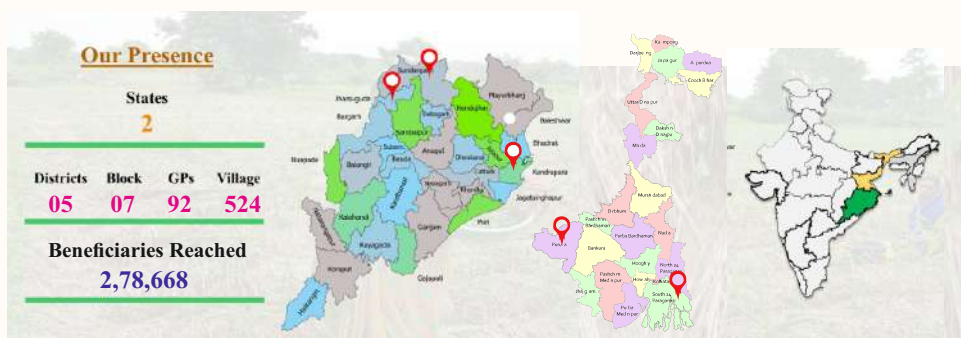
Human Resource

Integrated Village Development Program

Enable | Empower | Transform



The **Integrated Village Development Programme (IVDP)**, implemented by AJKA with the support of **LTMindtree Foundation**, adopts an integrated and community-led approach to rural development.

During 2025–26, IVDP was implemented in:

- **Lakhanpur, Jharsuguda, Odisha:** 42 villages | 7,638 households | 31,833 population
- **Balarampur, Purulia, West Bengal:** 42 villages | 16,668 households | 23,632 population

The programme was aligned with the **NITI Aayog Aspirational Blocks Programme** and contributed to relevant **UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)**.

IVDP integrated four interconnected themes:

Environment

Water conservation, climate-resilient agriculture, soil health, irrigation and agroforestry.

Empowerment

Women-led livelihoods, financial literacy, farmer institutions, enterprises and market linkages.

Inclusive & Quality Education

Scholarships, remedial education, school infrastructure and early childhood development.

Health & Nutrition

Health screening, referral, nutrition awareness, kitchen gardens and support to vulnerable households.

Approach

Community Participation + Government Convergence + Institutional Strengthening + Partnerships = Sustainable Development



Thematic Area : Environment

Water + Soil + Agriculture + Agroforestry

Building the natural resource base for resilient livelihoods:

IVDP invested in water conservation, irrigation, soil health, sustainable agriculture and agroforestry to strengthen both ecological and livelihood resilience.

Key achievements

- ◆ **15 farm ponds** established across the two project areas.
- ◆ **6 solar irrigation systems** promoted to improve water-use efficiency.
- ◆ **20,000 mango saplings** distributed in Balarampur.
- ◆ **7 vermicompost units** established.
- ◆ **4,000 farmers** sensitised on soil health.
- ◆ Diversification into ginger, chilli, mustard and other high-value crops.

In Balarampur, 10 farm ponds created irrigation potential across approximately **328 acres, benefiting 572 farmers**. Solar irrigation systems supported approximately **92 acres and 124 farmers**.

In Lakhanpur, ginger, chilli and mustard cultivation together covered **250 acres** involving **414 farmers**.



Impact:

The interventions are helping communities transition from rainfall-dependent farming towards **more diversified, water-secure, resource-efficient and climate-resilient agriculture**.

Thematic Area : Empowerment

Women + Farmers + Skills + Institutions + Livelihoods

Turning opportunities into income, agency and community ownership:

AJKA's empowerment approach goes beyond asset distribution by combining **skills, financial literacy, productive resources, institutions and market opportunities**.

Key achievements:

- ◆ **100 women farmers** supported for mushroom cultivation.
- ◆ **30 farmers** trained in scientific fish farming.
- ◆ **225 women SHG members** trained in financial literacy.
- ◆ Women supported through livelihood activities including mushroom, beekeeping, jute and bakery enterprises.

- Community-managed **Agri-Equipment Bank** established.
- Polyhouse at Indarpur produced **1,60,000 chilli saplings** for IVDP farmers.
- Polyhouse generated **1.65 lakh external market revenue**.



The **1,000 sq. metre polyhouse** has an annual production capacity of up to **12 lakh quality saplings**, creating a local source of quality planting material and strengthening community enterprise.

Impact:

The programme is helping women, farmers and community institutions move from individual livelihood support towards **collective economic action, enterprise development and greater self-reliance**.

Inclusive and Quality Education

Access + Learning + Aspiration + Early Childhood Development

Education remained a key pathway for reducing vulnerability and expanding opportunities for children.

Key Achievements:

- 250 students** received scholarships of Rs. 3,000 each.
- 600 students** received remedial coaching.
- 1,600 students** benefited from school infrastructure improvements.
- 2 Smart Anganwadi Centres** established.
- Remedial support focused on **English, Mathematics and Science**.

In Lakhanpur, **100 students** received scholarships and **279 students** benefited from remedial coaching.

In Balarampur, **150 vulnerable and meritorious students** received scholarships, while **321 students** benefited from remedial coaching at Bara Urma High School.

Impact:

The interventions helped for improving access to educational support, strengthen learning environments and encourage children from vulnerable households to **remain in education, improve learning outcomes and aspire for higher education**.

Health & Nutrition

Prevention + Nutrition + Food Security + Social Protection

AJKA adopted a preventive and community-based approach to health and nutrition through screening, referral, awareness, kitchen gardens and support to vulnerable households.

Key Achievements:

- ◆ **22,570 people** reached through health screening.
- ◆ **2,660 people** counselled and referred in Balarampur.
- ◆ **200 households** supported with kitchen gardens.
- ◆ **737 vulnerable households** received ration support.
- ◆ Nutrition awareness promoted balanced diets using locally available foods.

Health camps in Lakhanpur reached **9,904 people**, while screening in Balarampur reached **12,666 people** for diabetes and hypertension.

Impact:

The interventions strengthened **early identification, health awareness, nutrition security and household resilience**, particularly among vulnerable families.

Integration creates greater impact

Water security, agriculture, livelihoods, education and health are interconnected. Integrated interventions generate stronger and more sustainable outcomes.

Community ownership drives sustainability

Community-managed institutions such as SHGs, Producer Groups and the Agri-Equipment Bank demonstrate the importance of involving communities in planning, management and maintenance.

Women are key drivers of resilience

Women's enterprises, financial literacy and collective action strengthen household incomes, decision-making and community participation.

Convergence multiplies impact

Partnerships with government departments, PRIs, schools, Anganwadi Centres, health institutions and other stakeholders increase the reach and sustainability of interventions.

Small investments can unlock aspirations

Scholarships, remedial education and targeted livelihood support can create confidence, opportunity and aspirations that extend far beyond the immediate intervention.

Way Forward

Building on the achievements of 2025–26, AJKA will focus on **deepening community ownership, government convergence, institutional capacity and strategic partnerships.**

Environment:

Scale climate-resilient agriculture, water conservation, soil-health management, agroforestry and efficient irrigation.

Empowerment:

Strengthen SHGs, FPOs, FIGs and community institutions while expanding women-led enterprises, value addition and market linkages.

Education:

Strengthen remedial education, learning outcomes, scholarships, learning environments and early childhood development.

Health & Nutrition:

Expand preventive healthcare, screening and referral, nutrition-sensitive agriculture, kitchen gardens and support to vulnerable households.



Agriculture Production Cluster



The **Agriculture Production Cluster (APC) Programme**, implemented by AJKA since **2021–22** in Jharsuguda Sadar and Lakhanpur blocks, aims to create sustainable, market-oriented livelihoods for smallholder, tribal and vulnerable farmers.

The programme is supported through **DMF, Jharsuguda**, with convergence from relevant government departments.

2025–26 Key Achievements

6,000 farmers mobilised | 50 Producer Groups | 2 Producer Companies | 5,363.05 acres under high-value crops

Jharsuguda Sadar

- ◆ 3,000 farmers organised into **25 Producer Groups**.
- ◆ **1,824.46 acres** covered under high-value crops.
- ◆ **953 households** adopted NPM practices.
- ◆ **2,201 households** gained access to farm mechanisation.
- ◆ **272 households** covered under fruit plantation.
- ◆ Producer Company turnover: **Rs. 31.96 lakh**.

Lakhanpur

- ◆ **472 livestock shelters** constructed.

- ◆ **1,024 shareholders**.



Household Income Enhancement

The programme's longer-term objective is to enable **70% of participating households to double their income.**

Notable success stories include:

Santosini Meher: Cabbage cultivation on one acre generated approximately **1.60 lakh gross income and 1 lakh net profit.**

Rohini Padhan: Tomato cultivation on one acre generated approximately **7.50 lakh gross income and 6 lakh net profit.**

These experiences demonstrate the potential of combining **quality inputs, irrigation, improved practices, mechanisation and market linkages** to significantly enhance farm incomes.

The **Shree Anna Abhiyan**, formerly the Odisha Millets Mission, promotes sustainable millet production, consumption, nutrition, value addition and market linkages.

AJKA has been implementing the programme in **Jharsuguda and Lakhanpur blocks since 2022–23**, working with farmers, women's groups and community institutions.

Way Forward

AJKA will continue to promote **climate-resilient millet production, household consumption, value addition, farmer institutions and market linkages.**

Mechanised Direct Seeded Rice



To promote water- and labour-efficient rice cultivation, AJKA facilitated mechanised DSR under the Government of Odisha's PIPP initiative.

2025–26 Achievement

600 hectares | 5 blocks | 100% annual target achieved

The intervention included farmer mobilisation, cluster identification, training, mechanised sowing through tractor-mounted seed drills, Integrated Weed Management and field-level handholding.

The programme demonstrated that **timely mobilisation, machinery access, technical support and cluster-based implementation** are critical for successful DSR adoption.



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Agroforestry & Mangrove Conservation



With support from **LTMindtree Foundation**, AJKA implemented agroforestry and mangrove maintenance initiatives across Odisha and West Bengal.

Key Achievements:

20,000 new mango plantations

1,05,387 fruit-bearing trees maintained

15,000 mangrove plantations maintained in Odisha

2,20,531 total trees/plantations

687 acres covered

15,082 beneficiaries



The programme combined **plant, protect and sustain** approaches to environmental conservation, strengthening green cover, ecosystem resilience, community participation and long-term livelihood assets.

Micro Watershed Development

**Conserving Water & Environment
Sustaining Livelihood**



With NABARD support, AJKA implemented the **Jharan Watershed and Girigobardhan Project** in Lakhanpur to strengthen groundwater recharge, soil and water conservation, sustainable agriculture and climate resilience.

A Measurable Outcome:

Groundwater depth improved from approximately **24 ft BGL to 18 ft BGL**, representing a **6-foot rise in the groundwater table**.

This provides a strong field-level indication of improved groundwater recharge and water retention resulting from watershed interventions.

Project Vidya

Strengthening Quality Education
in Government Schools



With support from **Vedanta Coal Mines**, AJKA implemented the VIDYA Project in Hemgir, Sundargarh and Lakhanpur, Jharsuguda.

2025–26 at a Glance:

19 Additional Teachers | 17 Government Schools

- Hemgir: **11 teachers in 9 schools**
- Lakhanpur: **8 teachers in 8 schools**
- Key subjects: **Mathematics, Science and English**
- Primary focus: **Foundational Literacy and Numeracy**
- Remedial support for students with learning gaps
- SMC and parent engagement
- Regular monitoring and teacher review

The intervention strengthened teacher availability and enabled more focused academic support, particularly for students requiring additional assistance in **English and Mathematics**.



Extending a Helping Hand

AJKA's Humanitarian Support to Vulnerable Rural Households



For Anchalik Jana Kalyan Anusthan (AJKA), development is not limited to creating livelihoods or strengthening community institutions; it also means standing beside families when their immediate needs become difficult to meet. Guided by this humanitarian responsibility, AJKA, under its Integrated Village Development Programme (IVDP) 2025–26, extended essential food support to economically deprived and socially vulnerable households in rural communities.

Food insecurity often places an additional burden on families that are already struggling with limited and uncertain incomes. Recognizing that timely assistance can provide not only material relief but also dignity and a sense of social security, AJKA facilitated the provision of essential ration kits to 100 vulnerable households from Kanaktora, Badimal, Pithinda and Charpali Gram Panchayats. The support was intended to help families meet their immediate household food requirements and reduce the financial pressure associated with purchasing essential food items.

The initiative reflects AJKA's broader approach to community development, in which humanitarian assistance and long-term development are viewed as complementary rather than separate interventions. While sustainable livelihoods, education, health and community empowerment remain important pillars of development, vulnerable families may at times require immediate support to overcome short-term hardship. Such assistance helps create the minimum level of security from which families can gradually pursue longer-term opportunities.

The beneficiaries represented some of the most economically and socially vulnerable sections of the communities. For these households, the ration kits were more than a collection of food items. They provided temporary relief from food-related financial stress and conveyed a message that vulnerable families are not alone in times of difficulty. Beneficiary feedback reflected both practical relief and a renewed feeling of social inclusion and dignity.

The initiative also reflects the importance of community-based organizations in responding to local needs. Mrs. Punyamayee Helen Xes, District Social Welfare Officer, Jharsuguda, appreciated AJKA's efforts and emphasized the practical and timely nature of such interventions for vulnerable families. She also highlighted the role of community organizations in strengthening welfare support at the grassroots level.

For AJKA, however, humanitarian assistance is not viewed as a substitute for sustainable development. Rather, it is part of a continuum of support through which immediate vulnerabilities are addressed while communities are simultaneously encouraged towards greater self-reliance. As reiterated by the organization's leadership, AJKA remains committed to combining immediate welfare support with longer-term measures for sustainable rural development and social empowerment.

The support extended to the 100 households therefore represents more than a one-time distribution of essential commodities. It reflects AJKA's belief that development must remain people-centred, compassionate and responsive to the realities faced by disadvantaged families. By reaching out to households during periods of need, AJKA seeks to uphold the dignity of vulnerable communities while strengthening the foundation for their long-term well-being.

This humanitarian intervention under IVDP 2025–26 reinforces AJKA's continuing commitment to marginalized communities and demonstrates that meaningful development begins with responding to people's immediate concerns while working towards a more secure, resilient and empowered future.



Stories of Change

Strengthening Quality Education in Government Schools

Now Water Comes with the Sun

Lakhanpur, Jharsuguda

Solar-powered irrigation enabled small and marginal farmers to reduce dependence on rainfall and explore additional crops such as summer paddy and vegetables—demonstrating how renewable energy can strengthen **water security, crop diversification, income and climate resilience**.



From Scholarship to Aspiration

Manshi Mahato, Balarampur

Manshi received a Rs.3,000 IVDP scholarship and subsequently secured **83% marks, standing first in her school**. She continued her higher education and began preparing for the CLAT examination.

Her journey demonstrates how targeted educational support can strengthen **confidence, continuity and aspirations**.



One Acre, Higher Income

Santosini Meher, Jharsuguda

With improved inputs and drip irrigation, Santosini cultivated cabbage on one acre, harvesting approximately **8,000 kg** and earning Rs. **1.60 lakh gross income** and Rs. **1 lakh net profit** in one season.



A New Opportunity through Tomato Cultivation

Rohini Padhan, Jharsuguda

Rohini adopted improved tomato cultivation using trellis and solar irrigation. Her one-acre crop produced approximately **25,000 kg**, generating Rs. **7.50 lakh gross income** and Rs. **6 lakh net profit**.

Conclusion

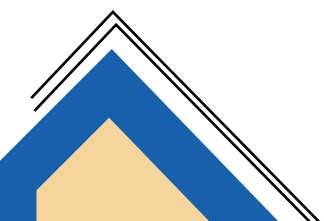
The year **2025–26** reflects AJKA's continued commitment to **turning community needs into meaningful action and measurable results**.
